During our tutor time, we linked our new value, Ambition, with career education and how they should be projecting themselves in the future and what options they have at college, army or apprenticeship level.



As we approach the conclusion of this half term, I am pleased our Primary team will be able to share with you some memorable highlights of the last few weeks. Our days have been full of exciting learning experiences (sometimes muddy and cold), a number of fabulous class assemblies, some fascinating staff training and continued work to help our pupils understand and demonstrate our values of Ambition, Inclusion and Respect to a greater degree!

Another thrilling focus this term has been our study of Sir Ernest Shackleton and his remarkable journey to Antarctica. The Year 5 pupils have been immersed in the lessons of resilience and determination exhibited by Shackleton and his crew during their harrowing expedition. This historical context has not only opened their minds to the challenges of exploration but has also provided an excellent opportunity for cross-curricular learning, spanning literature, geography, and science.

Linked to this and in a splendid display of talent, our Dance Live! group has secured third place

in the recent competition! It was amazing to hear the buzz of support for Mayfield at the Guildhall last week and this achievement not only reflects the hard work of our children in Years 4 to 6 but also assures us a place in the finals scheduled for April. Further details will be shared with you in the next half term, and we invite you to join us in celebrating their success. A great big thank you to the staff involved who have choreographed, built props, led on afterschool rehearsals and supported on the day.

One of my highlights this half term has been teaching Rugby to Pacific class as part of their PE curriculum. It has been a challenge navigating the difference between pupils in the group – some fiercely competitive and others who would much prefer to stay mostly in one spot, which I understand entirely as it has possibly been the coldest January in history...

I would also like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to our lunchtime leaders, who have approached their responsibilities with remarkable diligence. Their commitment to ensuring that lunchtimes

What a fantastic half term we have had! Our theme of 'Once Upon a Time' has inspired the children, sparking their imaginations and leading to some incredible learning experiences. We kicked off our journey with an exciting mystery: Who was the porridge thief? The children were absolutely engrossed in solving this mystery, showcasing their natural curiosity and problem-solving skills.

As we dived deeper into our theme, we explored the classic tale of Jack and the Beanstalk. The children thoroughly enjoyed re-enacting Jack's adventures as he cleverly navigated his escape from the giant. Their enthusiasm in orally narrating the stories and acting them out was infectious! We have been particularly impressed by their amazing writing skills, as they demonstrated their Phonetic knowledge and handwriting.

Sensory exploration has also played a key role in our learning this half term. We engaged our senses by examining ice, tasting warm porridge, and exploring various textures through sensory play activities. Watching the children express their thoughts and feelings about these experiences has been incredibly rewarding.

We celebrated Chinese New Year and the children showed lots of enthusiasm as we learnt about different customs and traditions, culminating in a delicious feast of Chinese cuisine. The children loved the opportunity to try new foods and learn about different cultures.

Overall, this half term has been a great success, filled with laughter, learning, and creativity. We are so proud of the children's achievements and can't wait to see what adventures the next term holds!

Wow, what another busy half-term. The children in Year 1 have covered so much over the past 6 weeks.

In English we have been continuing with reading poems as well as stories, but also covered poetry in some of our writing lessons. We were so proud of some of the poems the children wrote about the ocean. We have also enjoyed instruction writing this half-term, as our instructions were all about how to make a moving picture. The children learnt about moving pictures in DT. Over a number of lessons they learnt about the different types and how to make them, explored with materials, planned and designed what they were going to do, and then made the picture they had designed. They were therefore experts when it came to writing instructions on how to make them! They will be bringing their amazing moving pictures home this week.

Phonics has been quite challenging this halfterm, continuing to 'grow the code'. They have continued to learn many more alternative sounds and a range of tricky words, but they have all rose to the challenge and are progressing well. Remember we send home the weekly phonic sheet to let you know the sounds we have been focusing on, so you can discuss this with your children. Maybe you could look out for the sounds in books at home. Well done again to all the children who are reading 5 times a week, especially to the children who are working towards their silver award and prize!

In Maths, we have been focusing on numbers 1-10 and additive structures, which has involved looking at more and less and comparing numbers, and the different models we can use to show part, part, whole. We have also had a big focus on addition and subtraction stories and looking at how numbers increase and decrease. Maybe you could ask your children to tell you an addition or subtraction story.

In Science, we have been learning all about materials. The children can now talk about what materials are and their properties. We've started to look at what materials would be good for a certain purpose, and we will be continuing our learning about materials in science next half-term.

Our wider curriculum learning has continued to be action packed this half-term. As already mentioned, DT has been all about moving pictures, but we have also been learning about hot and cold places in Geography. This has included looking at seasonal changes, climates and understanding geographic terms. We've also been learning musical vocabulary in music, and loved using the benches in gymnastics for PE. The teachers were exceptionally proud of the class thankful poems the children wrote together during our RE topic.

The children have particularly enjoyed ICT this half-term as we have had weekly usage of the bee-bots. They have now learnt how to programme a robot to be able to move to and from certain points.

We have had a wonderful time this half term in Year 2. We have been exploring the fascinating world of materials. The children have been learning about different types of materials and their properties. We've discussed how some materials are durable, meaning they can withstand wear and tear, while others might break or wear down more easily. We've also looked at how materials can be opaque or transparent. The children have enjoyed handson activities where they tested various materials to see which ones are best suited for different purposes. This learning helps them understand the importance of choosing the right material for everyday objects.

In our reading lessons, Year 2 have been enjoying the book Coming to England, which follows the journey of a family as they make an adventurous move from Thailand to England. Through this story, the children are learning about the challenges and excitement of moving to a new country and experiencing a different culture. The book beautifully highlights how people from various backgrounds bring their unique traditions, foods, and customs to new places, enriching the local community. We also explored Street Beneath My Feet, which gave us a deeper understanding of the diverse world beneath our streets and how different cultures have shaped our surroundings. These stories are sparking important conversations in class about cultural diversity and the value of learning from different people and places.

We hope your children have been enjoying reading the little wandle books that have been coming home. Please don't forget to write in their reading logs so they get recognised for their hard work at home and get those reading book marks.

We have been busy writing in a variety of styles. We've completed a non-chronological report about the materials we've been learning about in science, where we identified key facts about the properties of materials, ensuring that the correct structures are being used. The students have worked hard to gather and present information in an organised way, showcasing their understanding of the topic. In addition, we have also written a formal invitation to the King, inviting him to visit our school and see our fantastic achievements, especially the flags we have been designing and creating in Design and Technology. The children have put great effort into making the flags and are excited to share their hard work.

In our maths lessons, Year 2 have been busy learning about equal and not equal groups. The children have been exploring how to identify and organise objects into groups and understand when groups are equal in size. We've also focused on how to write multiplication equations correctly, connecting the concept of groups to mathematical operations. The students have been practicing how to represent and solve multiplication problems, building a solid foundation for more advanced concepts in the future. They are enjoying the hands-on activities that help reinforce these important skills.

As we reach the end of another fantastic half-term, we would like to share some of the wonderful learning experiences your children have enjoyed over the past few weeks.

Geography & Writing

In Geography, we have been exploring UK Studies, focusing on some of the country's most famous landmarks. The children have applied their knowledge in their writing, creating fantastic pieces about famous UK landmarks. They are now experts on the Spinnaker Tower—Why not ask them to share a fun fact with you?

Maths

This half-term, we have been developing our confidence in addition and subtraction, exploring and choosing different strategies to solve problems. The children have been working hard to apply these methods accurately in their learning.

PE

Year 3 have amazed us with their rhythmic gymnastics routines, demonstrating fantastic control, creativity, and teamwork. They have also been honing their basketball skills, improving their dribbling, passing, and shooting techniques. Well done, everyone!

Looking Ahead

Next term, we embark on an exciting new topic: The Romans! The children will dive into history, discovering what life was like in Roman Britain. We are thrilled to announce a trip to Fishbourne Roman Palace, where they will have the opportunity to see real Roman artefacts and learn even more about this fascinating period.

This half-term has been a fantastic time for Year 4, filled with creativity, discovery, and hands-on learning experiences!

In Art, we have been exploring the beauty of patterns inspired by the rainforest. The children have been studying the intricate details found in nature and using them as inspiration for their own artwork. As part of this project, they will soon be creating a piece of batik artwork, a traditional wax-resist technique that will bring their rainforest-inspired designs to life.

History lessons have been particularly exciting as we have been delving into the world of the Anglo-Saxons and Vikings. Year 4 have loved learning about these fascinating groups of people, their way of life, and their impact on Britain. From fierce battles to incredible longships, the children have been fully engaged in uncovering the past.

One of the most memorable moments in Science this half-term was a very special (and slightly messy!) lesson investigating the diet of different animals. The children became scientists for this lesson, carefully examining 'poo' samples (don't worry—it wasn't real!) to determine whether the animals were herbivores, carnivores, or omnivores. This hands-on approach made for a fun and engaging learning experience that will certainly be remembered!

It has been a brilliant half-term, and we can't wait to see what the next one brings!

With Christmas and New Year now a distant memory, this half term just seems to have sped on by! But, we have managed to cram in an incredible amount of fabulous learning in Year 5 and here is a mere snippet of what we have been up to! In reading, we have focused on two texts this half term. We started with 'A Midsummer Night's Dream – A Shakespeare Story', by Andrew Matthews. Here, we learnt about love, deceit and a crossover between the real world and one of magic, as relationships became entangled and then untangled for the ultimate happy ending. We then moved on to read 'I Am Not A Label', by Cerrie Burnell, an anthology of inspirational and trailblazing disabled role models who, despite many challenges, persevered to achieve great things and change the mindsets of millions between them.

In writing, we started the half term by writing a third person story with cultural references. We drew upon our learning in the Autumn Term, using our already established writing skills, along with our historical knowledge of the Greeks, in order to produce our stories. We applied skills such as, direct speech, using and sustaining the past tense and third person references, adding precise detail with expanded noun phrases, along with those all important Greek cultural references. We then moved on to writing a formal letter with persuasive devices. Having designed parachutes in Science, as part of our forces and friction work, we wrote to Parachute LTD to persuade them to take on our designs! We finished the half term by writing playscripts and turned pros into playscript, transforming 'A Midsummer Nights' Dream - A Shakespeare Story', from our reading unit, into a playscript.

In Maths, we have spent the half term learning about multiplication and division, using informal and formal methods for efficiency. We have been learning about short and expanded multiplication and short division, using regrouping and solving problems with remainders. We finished the half term learning about Area, focusing on areas of shapes and using squares as a unit of measurement. We compared different shapes that have the same area as part of our problemsolving skill application.

In Science, we have been learning about Forces and Friction. We have learnt about different types of forces and how they are measured. We have investigated what materials would be best, along with investigative designs, in order to design our own parachutes. In Geography, we have been learning about map reading skills, using both 4

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figure and 6 figure grid references. We have located places on maps, with accuracy, using map symbols. In Computing, we have been using software to layer shapes and produce Vector art. We have learnt about copying and pasting shapes, using colour, layering and resizing. In PSHE, we have been learning about Valuing Differences and the importance of effective communication, using lots of role play in applying our core school values to our work.

We really enjoyed our Visit to Runway's End Outdoor Education Centre this half term, allowing us to get into role having been selected by Ernest Shackleton to join his crew upon his ship, The Endurance, and attend 'boot camp' activities at the centre. This, following on from the persuasive letters we wrote to him in the Autumn Term to become part of his expedition crew. The visit also allowed us to apply, firsthand, our skills of communication that we have been learning in PSHE, as well as carrying out field work linked to our Geography unit. As you can see, we have been very busy in Year 5 indeed! We thank all of our parents and carers for your continued support and look forward to another busy and successful half term ahead, along with the feeling of that long-awaited spring weather!

Year 6 have had a fantastic half term, packed full of exciting learning and challenges across all subjects! In Maths, we have been building on our arithmetic skills and applying them to problem-solving tasks. By practising different strategies, we have gained confidence in tackling tricky multi-step problems and explaining our reasoning.

In writing, we have become budding journalists, producing newspaper reports based on Pig Heart Boy, the novel we read last half term. We explored how to write engaging headlines, structure our articles effectively, and use formal language to report on key events from the story. Our class discussions helped us consider different viewpoints and reflect on the ethical dilemmas presented in the book.

Our history lessons have been particularly eye-opening as we have been learning about the Windrush generation. We have explored why people from the Caribbean came to Britain after World War II, the challenges they faced, and their contributions to British society. Through historical sources and discussions, we have developed a deeper understanding of this important part of our history.

In science, we have been discovering how animals and plants adapt to their environments in our evolution and adaptation topic. We have investigated how characteristics are passed down through generations and explored famous scientists like Charles Darwin. From camouflage to natural selection, we have been fascinated by the incredible ways species change to survive.

It has been a brilliant half term of learning, and we are looking forward to the next one!
